DECISION ON ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS¹

Dorsey, Chief Special Master:

On July 29, 2015, petitioner filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,² (the "Vaccine Act"). Petitioner alleged that he suffered cellulitis and adhesive capsulitis as a result of a Tetanus-diphtheria-acellular pertussis ("Tdap") vaccination. On June 20, 2016, the undersigned issued a decision awarding compensation to petitioner based on respondent's proffer. (ECF No. 33).

On September 29, 2016, petitioner filed a motion for attorneys' fees and costs. (ECF No. 38). Petitioner requests attorneys' fees in the amount of \$24,513.30,

attorneys' costs in the amount of \$637.24, and petitioner's out-of-pocket costs in the amount of \$400.00 for a total amount of \$25,550.54. *Id.* at 1. In accordance with General Order #9, petitioner's counsel represents that petitioner incurred \$400.00 in out-of-pocket expenses.

On October 17, 2016, respondent filed a response to petitioner's motion. (ECF No. 40). Respondent argues that "[n]either the Vaccine Act nor Vaccine Rule 13 contemplates any role for respondent in the resolution of a request by a petitioner for an award of attorneys' fees and costs." *Id.* at 1. Respondent adds, however, that she "is satisfied the statutory requirements for an award of attorneys' fees and costs are met in this case." *Id.* at 2. Additionally, she "asserts that a reasonable amount for fees and costs in the present case would fall between \$12,000.00 to \$14,000.00" but provides no basis or explanation for how she arrived at this proposed range. *Id.* at 3.

On October 27, 2016, petitioner filed a reply. (ECF No. 41). Petitioner argues that respondent offers no specific objections to petitioners' application for attorneys' fees and costs, but "a 'blanket' objection based upon a vague and unhelpful survey." *Id.* at 9.

The undersigned has reviewed the billing records submitted with petitioner's request. In the undersigned's experience, the request appears reasonable, and the undersigned finds no cause to reduce the requested hours or rates.

Petitioner requests additional attorneys' fees in the amount of \$468.50 for preparing the reply. Petitioner's Supplemental Application for Attorneys' Fees at 1, Tab A at 2. The undersigned finds the request for additional hours spent preparing the reply to be reasonable and awards the full amount requested for preparation of the reply brief, **\$468.50**.³ Thus, the total amount awarded for attorneys' fees and costs is **\$25,619.04**.

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs. § 15(e). Based on the reasonableness of petitioner's request, the undersigned **GRANTS** petitioner's motion for attorneys' fees and costs.

Accordingly, the undersigned awards the total of \$26,019.04⁴ as follows:

⁴ This amount is intended to cover all legal expenses incurred in this matter. This award encompasses all charges by the attorney against a client, "advanced costs" as well as fees for legal services rendered. Furthermore, § 15(e)(3) prevents an attorney from charging or collecting fees (including costs) that would be in addition to the amount awarded herein. See generally *Beck v. Sec'y of Health & Human Servs.*, 924 F.2d 1029 (Fed. Cir.1991).

- **A lump sum of \$25,619.04 (\$24,981.80 in attorneys' fees and \$637.24 in attorneys' costs, representing reimbursement for attorneys' fees and costs, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner and petitioner's counsel, Ronald Craig Homer; and**
- **A lump sum of \$400.00, representing reimbursement for petitioner's costs, in the form of a check payable to petitioner.**

The clerk of the court shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.⁵

IT IS SO ORDERED.
