DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES¹

Dorsey, Chief Special Master:

On June 16, 2016, petitioner filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that as a result of her September 22, 2015 influenza (“flu”) vaccination she suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”). Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On September 19, 2016, a ruling on entitlement was issued, finding petitioner entitled to compensation for SIRVA. On February 7, 2017, respondent filed a proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”) indicating petitioner should be awarded \$148,118.08. Proffer at 1. In the Proffer, respondent represented that petitioner agrees with the proffered award.

Based on the record as a whole, the undersigned finds that petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Proffer, **the undersigned awards petitioner a lump sum payment of \$148,118.08 in the form of a check payable to petitioner, Barbara Sanders.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under § 300aa-15(a).

The clerk of the court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

RESPONDENT’S PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION

I. Items of Compensation

For purposes of this proffer, the term “vaccine-related” is as described in Respondent’s Rule 4(c) Report, filed on September 16, 2016, conceding entitlement in this case. Based upon the evidence of record, respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded \$148,118.08. This represents all elements of competition to which petitioner would be entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a) for her vaccine-related injury.¹ Petitioner agrees.

II. Form of the Award

The parties recommend that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment described below, and request that the Special Master’s decision and the Court’s judgment award the following:

A lump sum of \$148,118.08 in the form of a check payable to petitioner, Barbara Sanders. This amounts accounts for all elements of compensation under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a) to which petitioner would be entitled.

¹ Should petitioner die prior to entry of judgment, the parties reserve the right to move the Court for appropriate relief. In particular, respondent would oppose any award for future medical expenses, future lost earnings, and future pain and suffering.

Petitioner is a competent adult. Evidence of guardianship is not required in this case.
