RULING ON ENTITLEMENT¹

Dorsey, Chief Special Master:

On June 30, 2016, Irene Deniston (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered right shoulder injuries that were caused-in-fact by an influenza (“flu”) vaccine on October 21, 2014. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On October 31, 2016, respondent filed her Rule 4(c) report in which she concedes that petitioner is entitled to compensation in this case. Respondent’s Rule 4(c) Report at 1. Specifically, respondent states that “petitioner’s alleged injury is consistent with shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (‘SIRVA’), and that was caused in fact by the flu vaccine she received on October 21, 2014. *Id.* at 5-6. Respondent further agrees that no other causes for petitioner’s SIRVA were identified

and the records show that petitioner suffered the sequela of her injury for more than six months. *Id.* at 6.

In view of respondent's concession and the evidence before me, the undersigned finds that petitioner is entitled to compensation.
