DECISION ON JOINT STIPULATION¹

On October 14, 2016, petitioner filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (“Vaccine Act”), 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10, *et seq.*² Petitioner initially alleged that he suffered optic neuritis (“ON”) and multiple sclerosis (“MS”) as a result of his October 24, 2013 Human Papillomavirus (“HPV”) vaccination. Petition at 1. Petitioner later amended his petition to allege that he suffered ON and MS as a result of the HPV and/or Meningococcal vaccines he received on October 24, 2013. Amended Petitioner at 1; Stipulation, filed November 18, 2025, at ¶¶ 1-2, 4. Petitioner further alleges that he has experienced the residual effects of his condition for more than six months, that there has been no prior award or settlement of a civil action for damages as a result of his condition, and that his vaccine was administered in the United States. Amended Petition at 2, 5-6; Stipulation at ¶¶ 3-5. “Respondent denies that the HPV and Meningococcal vaccines caused petitioner to suffer from ON, MS, or any other injury or his current condition, and denies that the

vaccines significantly aggravated ON, MS, or any other injury or condition.” Stipulation at ¶ 6.

Nevertheless, on November 18, 2025, the parties filed the attached joint stipulation, stating that a decision should be entered awarding compensation. I find the stipulation reasonable and adopt it as the decision of the Court in awarding damages, on the terms set forth therein.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Stipulation, **I award the following compensation:**

- 1) A lump sum of \$209,835.08, which amount represents compensation for first year life care expenses and pain and suffering, to be paid through an ACH deposit to petitioner’s counsel’s IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to petitioner; and**
- 2) An amount sufficient to purchase the annuity contract described in paragraph 10 of the Joint Stipulation, to be paid to the life insurance company from which the annuity will be purchased (the “Life Insurance Company”).**

Stipulation at ¶ 8. These amounts represent compensation for all items of damages that would be available under § 15(a). *Id.*

In the absence of a motion for review filed pursuant to RCFC Appendix B, the clerk of the court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

6. Respondent denies that the HPV and Meningococcal vaccines caused petitioner to suffer from ON, MS, or any other injury or his current condition, and denies that the vaccines significantly aggravated ON, MS, or any other injury or condition.

7. Maintaining their above-stated positions, the parties nevertheless now agree that the issues between them shall be settled and that a decision should be entered awarding the compensation described in paragraph 8 of this Stipulation.

8. As soon as practicable after an entry of judgment reflecting a decision consistent with the terms of this Stipulation, and after petitioner has filed an election to receive compensation pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-21(a)(1), the Secretary of Health and Human Services will issue the following vaccine compensation payments:

- a. A lump sum of \$209,835.08, which amount represents compensation for first year life care expenses and pain and suffering, to be paid through an ACH deposit to petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to petitioner; and
- b. An amount sufficient to purchase the annuity contract described in paragraph 10 below, paid to the life insurance company from which the annuity will be purchased (the "Life Insurance Company").

These amounts represent compensation for all damages that would be available under 42 U.S.C. §300aa-15(a).

9. The Life Insurance Company must have a minimum of \$250,000,000 capital and surplus, exclusive of any mandatory security valuation reserve. The Life Insurance Company must have one of the following ratings from two of the following rating organizations:

- a. A.M. Best Company: A++, A+, A+g, A+p, A+r, or A+s;
- b. Moody's Investor Service Claims Paying Rating: Aa3, Aa2, Aa1, or Aaa;
- c. Standard and Poor's Corporation Insurer Claims-Paying Ability Rating: AA-, AA, AA+, or AAA;
- d. Fitch Credit Rating Company, Insurance Company Claims Paying Ability Rating:

AA-, AA, AA+, or AAA.

10. The Secretary of Health and Human Services agrees to purchase an annuity contract from the Life Insurance Company for the benefit of petitioner, Justin Rogers, pursuant to which the Life Insurance Company will agree to make payments periodically to petitioner as follows for the following items of compensation available under 42 U.S.C. §300aa-15(a):

a. For future unreimbursable Blue Cross Preferred Provider Organization Maximum out of Pocket and Dimethyl Fumarate expenses, beginning on the first anniversary of the date of judgment, an annual amount of \$3,060.00 to be paid up to the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060, increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

b. For future unreimbursable Protective Sunglass, Walking Stick, Allowance for Visual Aid, Open Book Software, Kitchen Aid, and Ancillary Service expenses, beginning on the first anniversary of the date of judgment, an annual amount of \$949.90 to be paid for the remainder of petitioner's life, increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

c. For future unreimbursable Prescription Safety Glass expenses, beginning on the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060, an annual amount of \$350.00 to be paid for the remainder of petitioner's life, increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

d. For future unreimbursable Home Health Aide expenses, beginning on the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2030, an annual amount of \$13,520.00 to be paid up to the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2050. Then, beginning on the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2050, an annual amount of \$32,000.00 to be paid up to the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060. Thereafter, beginning on the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060, an annual amount of \$42,750.00 to be paid for the remainder of petitioner's life, all amounts increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

e. For future unreimbursable Transportation expenses, beginning on the first anniversary of the date of judgment, an annual amount of \$4,160.00 to be paid up to the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060. Thereafter, beginning on the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060, an annual amount of \$2,080.00 to be paid for the remainder of petitioner's life, all amounts increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

f. For future unreimbursable Ergonomic Evaluation expenses, beginning on the first anniversary of the date of judgment, an annual amount of \$260.00 to be paid up to the

anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2060, increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

g. For future unreimbursable Allowance for Computer Station expenses, beginning on the first anniversary of the date of judgment, an annual amount of \$519.80 to be paid up to the anniversary of the date of judgment in year 2056, increasing at the rate of three percent (3%), compounded annually from the date of judgment.

At the sole discretion of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, the periodic payments set forth in paragraph 10 above may be provided to petitioner in monthly, quarterly, annual or other installments. The “annual amounts” set forth above describe only the total yearly sum to be paid to petitioner and do not require that the payment be made in one annual installment. Petitioner will continue to receive the annuity payments from the Life Insurance Company only so long as he, Justin Rogers, is alive at the time that a particular payment is due. Written notice shall be provided to the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the Life Insurance Company within twenty (20) days of Justin Rogers’s death.

11. The annuity contract will be owned solely and exclusively by the Secretary of Health and Human Services and will be purchased as soon as practicable following the entry of a judgment in conformity with this Stipulation. The parties stipulate and agree that the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the United States of America are not responsible for the payment of any sums other than the amounts set forth in paragraph 8 herein and the amounts awarded pursuant to paragraph 13 herein, and that they do not guarantee or insure any of the future annuity payments. Upon the purchase of the annuity contract, the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the United States of America are released from any and all obligations with respect to future annuity payments.

12. The parties stipulate and agree that the annuity payments cannot be assigned, accelerated, deferred, increased, or decreased by the parties and that no part of any annuity

payments called for herein, nor any assets of the United States or the annuity company, are subject to execution or any legal process for any obligation in any manner. Petitioner and petitioner's heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns do hereby agree that they have no power or right to sell, assign, mortgage, encumber, or anticipate said annuity payments, or any part thereof, by assignment or otherwise, and further agree that they will not sell, assign, mortgage, encumber, or anticipate said annuity payments, or any part thereof, by assignment or otherwise.

13. As soon as practicable after the entry of judgment on entitlement in this case, and after petitioner has filed both a proper and timely election to receive compensation pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-21(a)(1), and an application, the parties will submit to further proceedings before the special master to award reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred in proceeding upon this petition.

14. Petitioner and his attorney represent that they have identified to respondent all known sources of payment for items or services for which the Program is not primarily liable under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(g), including State compensation programs, insurance policies, Federal or State health benefits programs (other than Title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. § 1396 et seq.)), or entities that provide health services on a pre-paid basis.

15. Payments made pursuant to paragraph 8 and any amounts awarded pursuant to paragraph 13 of this Stipulation will be made in accordance with 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(i), subject to the availability of sufficient statutory funds.

16. The parties and their attorneys further agree and stipulate that, except for any award for attorneys' fees and litigation costs, and past unreimbursable expenses, the money provided pursuant to this Stipulation either immediately or as part of the annuity contract, will be used

solely for petitioner's benefit as contemplated by a strict construction of 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-15(a) and (d), and subject to the conditions of 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-15(g) and (h).

17. In return for the payments described in paragraphs 8 and 13, petitioner, in his individual capacity, and on behalf of his heirs, executors, administrators, successors or assigns, does forever irrevocably and unconditionally release, acquit and discharge the United States and the Secretary of Health and Human Services from any and all actions or causes of action (including agreements, judgments, claims, damages, loss of services, expenses and all demands of whatever kind or nature) that have been brought, could have been brought, or could be timely brought in the Court of Federal Claims, under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10 et seq., on account of, or in any way growing out of, any and all known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected personal injuries to or death of petitioner resulting from, or alleged to have resulted from, the HPV and Meningococcal vaccinations administered on October 24, 2013, as alleged by petitioner in a petition for vaccine compensation filed on or about October 14, 2016, as amended in a first amended petition on or about November 29, 2016, and as amended in a second amended petition on or about July 22, 2021, in the United States Court of Federal Claims as petition No. 16-1349V.

18. If petitioner should die prior to entry of judgment, this agreement shall be voidable upon proper notice to the Court on behalf of either or both of the parties.

19. If the special master fails to issue a decision in complete conformity with the terms of this Stipulation or if the Court of Federal Claims fails to enter judgment in conformity with a decision that is in complete conformity with the terms of this Stipulation, then the parties' settlement and this Stipulation shall be voidable at the sole discretion of either party.

20. This Stipulation expresses a full and complete negotiated settlement of liability and damages claimed under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, as amended, except as otherwise noted in paragraph 13 above. There is absolutely no agreement on the part of the parties hereto to make any payment or to do any act or thing other than is herein expressly stated and clearly agreed to. The parties further agree and understand that the award described in this Stipulation may reflect a compromise of the parties' respective positions as to liability and/or amount of damages, and further, that a change in the nature of the injury or condition or in the items of compensation sought, is not grounds to modify or revise this agreement.

21. Petitioner hereby authorizes respondent to disclose documents filed by petitioner in this case consistent with the Privacy Act and the routine uses described in the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program System of Records, No. 09-15-0056.

22. This Stipulation shall not be construed as an admission by the United States or the Secretary of Health and Human Services that the HPV and Meningococcal vaccines caused petitioner to suffer ON, MS, or any other injury or his current condition.

23. All rights and obligations of petitioner hereunder shall apply equally to petitioner's heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and/or assigns.

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
