### **RULING ON ENTITLEMENT**<sup>1</sup>

**Dorsey**, Chief Special Master:

On March 10, 2017, petitioner filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,<sup>2</sup> (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”). Petition at 1, ¶ 2. Petitioner further alleged that she received the flu vaccine in the United States, suffered the residual effects of her injury for more than six months, and that no one, including petitioner, has filed a lawsuit or received a settlement or award for her injury alleged as vaccine caused. *Id.* at ¶¶ 15-17. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On November 6, 2017, respondent filed his Rule 4(c) report in which he concedes that petitioner is entitled to compensation in this case. Respondent's Rule 4(c) Report at 1. Specifically, respondent "has concluded that a preponderance of evidence establishes that petitioner's injury is consistent with a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration ("SIRVA"), and that it was caused-in-fact by the flu vaccine she received on November 3, 2015." *Id.* at 4. Respondent further agrees that petitioner received a vaccine listed in the Vaccine Injury Table within the United States and has suffered the residual effects of her injury for more than six months. *Id.*

**In view of respondent's position and the evidence of record, the undersigned finds that petitioner is entitled to compensation.**
