RULING ON ENTITLEMENT¹

Dorsey, Chief Special Master:

On December 18, 2017, Chandra Novak (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered a right shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”) as a result of a tetanus-diphtheria-acellular pertussis (“Tdap”) vaccine she received on February 17, 2015. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On November 5, 2018, respondent filed his Rule 4(c) report in which he concedes that petitioner is entitled to compensation in this case. Respondent's Rule 4(c) Report at 1. Specifically, respondent states "that petitioner suffered bursitis in her right shoulder, and that it was caused-in-fact by the Tdap vaccine she received on February 17, 2015. DICP has also concluded that the records show that petitioner suffered the sequelae of her injury for more than six months." *Id.* at 3-4.

In view of respondent's position and the evidence of record, the undersigned finds that petitioner is entitled to compensation.
