DECISION ON ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS¹

On November 8, 2018, petitioner filed a petition under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10, *et seq.* (2012) ("Vaccine Act").² (ECF No. 1.) Petitioner alleged that he suffered Bell's palsy, hearing loss, and neuropathy, as a result of a September 19, 2017 influenza ("flu") and hepatitis B vaccination. (*Id.*) A decision was issued on February 9, 2024, dismissing the case. (ECF No. 70.) On April 15, 2024, petitioner filed a final motion for attorneys' fees and costs. (ECF No. 76.) Petitioner requests a total of \$106,707.10, including \$81,280.50 for attorneys' fees and \$25,426.60 for costs. (*Id.* at 9.)

On April 19, 2024, respondent filed a response to petitioner's motion. (ECF No. 77.) Respondent argues that "[n]either the Vaccine Act nor Vaccine Rule 13 requires respondent to file a response to a request by a petitioner for an award of attorneys' fees

and costs.” (*Id.* at 1.) Respondent adds, however, that he “is satisfied the statutory requirements for an award of attorneys’ fees and costs are met in this case.” (*Id.* at 2.) Respondent requests “that the [c]ourt exercise its discretion and determine a reasonable award for attorneys’ fees and costs.” (*Id.* at 3.)

It is “well within the special master’s discretion” to determine the reasonableness of fees. *Saxton v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 3 F.3d 1517, 1521-22 (Fed. Cir. 1993); *see also Hines ex rel. Sevier v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 22 Cl. Ct. 750, 753 (1991) (“[T]he reviewing court must grant the special master wide latitude in determining the reasonableness of both attorneys’ fees and costs.”). The Federal Circuit has approved the lodestar approach to determine reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs under the Vaccine Act. *Avera v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 515 F.3d 1343, 1347 (Fed. Cir. 2008). This is a two-step process. *Id.* at 1347-48. First, a court determines an “initial estimate . . . by ‘multiplying the number of hours reasonably expended on the litigation times a reasonable hourly rate.’” *Id.* (quoting *Blum v. Stenson*, 465 U.S. 886, 888 (1984)). Second, the court may make an upward or downward departure from the initial calculation of the fee award based on specific findings. *Id.* at 1348.

Applications for attorneys’ fees must include contemporaneous and specific billing records that indicate the work performed and the number of hours spent on said work. *See Savin v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 85 Fed. Cl. 313, 316-18 (2008). Such applications should not include hours that are “excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary.” *Saxton*, 3 F.3d at 1521 (quoting *Hensley v. Eckerhart*, 461 U.S. 424, 434 (1983)). Attorneys’ costs must be reasonable as well. *See Ferreira v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 27 Fed. Cl. 29, 34 (1992) (“The conjunction ‘and’ conjoins both ‘attorneys’ fees’ and ‘other costs’ and the word ‘reasonable’ necessarily modifies both. Not only must any request for reimbursement of attorneys’ fees be reasonable, so also must any request for reimbursement of costs.”), *aff’d*, 33 F.3d 1375 (Fed. Cir. 1994). Special masters can reduce a fee request *sua sponte*, without providing petitioners notice and opportunity to respond. *See Sabella v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs.*, 86 Fed. Cl. 201, 209 (2009).

The undersigned has reviewed the billing records submitted with petitioner’s request. (ECF No. 76, Ex. 1.) In the undersigned’s experience, the request appears reasonable, and the undersigned finds no cause to reduce the requested hours or rates. The undersigned has also reviewed the cost records submitted with petitioner’s request. (ECF No. 76, Exs. 2, 4.) The undersigned finds the costs to be reasonable.

Accordingly, the undersigned awards a lump sum of \$106,707.10 in the form of a check jointly payable to petitioner and petitioner’s counsel, William E. Cochran, Jr.

The clerk of the court shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.³
