DECISION ON ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS¹

On January 28, 2019, Karl Tiedemann, Jr. ("petitioner") filed a petition in the National Vaccine Injury Program² alleging that as the result of an influenza ("flu") vaccine administered on November 18, 2016, he suffered chronic inflammatory demyelinating polyneuropathy ("CIDP"). Petition at Preamble (ECF No. 1). On June 28, 2022, the parties filed a stipulation, which the undersigned adopted as her decision awarding compensation on June 29, 2022. (ECF No. 72).

On January 3, 2023, petitioner filed a motion for attorney fees (ECF No. 78) (“Fees App.”). Petitioner requests compensation in the amount of \$61,520.12, representing \$40,722.50 in attorneys’ fees and \$20,797.62 in costs. Fees App. at 2. Pursuant to General Order No. 9, petitioner warrants that he has not personally incurred any costs in pursuit of her claim for compensation. (ECF No. 77). Respondent did not file a response to Petitioner’s motion for attorneys’ fees. The matter is now ripe for disposition.

For the reasons discussed below, the undersigned GRANTS petitioner’s motion and awards a total of \$58,240.12.

I. Discussion

Under the Vaccine Act, the special master shall award reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs for any petition that results in an award of compensation. 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(e)(1). When compensation is not awarded, the special master “may” award reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs “if the special master or court determines that the petition was brought in good faith and there was a reasonable basis for the claim for which the petition was brought.” *Id.* at §15(e)(1). In this case, because petitioner was awarded compensation pursuant to a stipulation, she is entitled to a final award of reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs.

a. Reasonable Attorneys’ Fees

The Federal Circuit has approved use of the lodestar approach to determine reasonable attorney’s fees and costs under the Vaccine Act. Avera v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs., 515 F.3d 1343, 1349 (Fed. Cir. 2008). Using the lodestar approach, a court first determines “an initial estimate of a reasonable attorney’s fee by ‘multiplying the number of hours reasonably expended on the litigation times a reasonable hourly rate.’” *Id.* at 1347-58 (quoting Blum v. Stenson, 465 U.S. 886, 888 (1984)). Then, the court may make an upward or downward departure from the initial calculation of the fee award based on other specific findings. *Id.* at 1348.

Counsel must submit fee requests that include contemporaneous and specific billing records indicating the service performed, the number of hours expended on the service, and the name of the person performing the service. See Savin v. Sec’y of Health and Human Servs., 85 Fed. Cl. 313, 316-18 (2008). Counsel should not include in their fee requests hours that are “excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary.” Saxton v. Sec’y of Health and Human Servs., 3 F.3d 1517, 1521 (Fed. Cir. 1993) (quoting Hensley v. Eckerhart, 461 U.S. 424, 434 (1983)). It is “well within the special master’s discretion to reduce the hours to a number that, in [her] experience and judgment, [is] reasonable for the work done.” *Id.* at 1522. Furthermore, the special master may reduce a fee request sua sponte, apart from objections raised by respondent and without providing a petitioner notice and opportunity to respond. See Sabella v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs., 86 Fed. Cl. 201, 209 (2009).

A special master need not engage in a line-by-line analysis of a petitioner’s fee application when reducing fees. Broekelschen v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs., 102 Fed. Cl.

719, 729 (2011). Special masters may rely on their experience with the Vaccine Program and its attorneys to determine the reasonable number of hours expended. Wasson v. Sec’y of Health and Human Servs., 24 Cl. Ct. 482, 484 (Fed. Cl. Nov. 19, 1991) rev’d on other grounds and aff’d in relevant part, 988 F. 2d 131 (Fed. Cir. 1993). Just as “[t]rial courts routinely use their prior experience to reduce hourly rates and the number of hours claimed in attorney fee requests ... [v]accine program special masters are also entitled to use their prior experience in reviewing fee application.” Saxton, 3 F. 3d at 1521.

i. Reasonable Hourly Rates

Petitioner requests the following hourly rates for the work of his counsel: for Ms. Bridget McCullough, \$225 per hour for 2018, \$250.00 per hour for work performed in 2019, \$275.00 per hour for work performed in 2020, \$300.00 per hour for work performed in 2021, and \$350.00 per hour for work performed in 2022 - 2023; for Mr. Paul Brazil, \$310.00 per hour for work performed in 2018; for Mr. Max Muller, \$350.00 per hour for work performed in 2020 and \$375.00 per hour for work performed in 2021; and for Ms. Leigh Finfer, \$185.00 per hour for work performed in 2019. These rates are consistent with what counsel have previously been awarded for their Vaccine Program work, and the undersigned finds them to be reasonable herein.

ii. Reasonable Hours Expended

In reducing an award of fees, the goal is to achieve rough justice, and therefore a special master may take into account their overall sense of a case and may use estimates when reducing an award. See Florence v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs., No. 15-255V, 2016 WL 6459592, at *5 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. Oct. 6, 2016) (citing Fox v. Vice, 563 U.S. 826, 838 (2011)). It is well established that an application for fees and costs must sufficiently detail and explain the time billed so that a special master may determine, from the application and the case file, whether the amount requested is reasonable. Bell v. Sec’y of Health & Human Servs., 18 Cl. Ct. 751, 760 (1989); Rodriguez, 2009 WL 2568468. Petitioner bears the burden of documenting the fees and costs claimed. Id. at *8.

The undersigned has reviewed the submitted billing entries and finds the total number of hours billed to be reasonable. The billing entries accurately reflect the nature of the work performed and the undersigned does not find any of the entries to be objectionable. Respondent also has not indicated that he finds any of the entries to be objectionable either. Petitioner is therefore awarded final attorneys’ fees of \$40,722.50.

b. Attorneys’ Costs

Petitioner requests a total of \$20,797.62 in attorneys’ costs. This amount is comprised of acquiring medical records, the Court’s filing fee, postage, and work performed by petitioner’s medical expert, Dr. Daniel Stein, and life care planner Roberta Hurley. The undersigned has reviewed the requested costs and finds them to be reasonable, with the exception of rates charged by Dr. Stein.

Dr. Stein billed his time at \$700.00 per hour, Fees App. at 35 - 36. This hourly rate is higher than what is usually awarded for experts in the Vaccine Program. Based upon the undersigned's experience and the work product submitted into the record, \$500.00 per hour is a reasonable hourly rate for Dr. Stein. Applying this rate to his time billed results in a reduction of \$3,280.00.³

II. Conclusion

Based on all of the above, the undersigned finds that it is reasonable compensate petitioner and his counsel as follows:

Accordingly, the undersigned awards \$58,240.12 in attorneys' fees and costs, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner and petitioner's counsel, Ms. Bridget McCullough.

In the absence of a motion for review filed pursuant to RCFC Appendix B, the Clerk of Court **SHALL ENTER JUDGMENT** in accordance with this decision.⁴

³ \$700 - \$500 = \$200 x 16.4 hours billed = \$3,280.00. It does not appear that Dr. Stein prepared or filed an expert report, and the time that he billed was spent on record review, which he billed at \$700 per hour. Based on these circumstances, the undersigned finds an hourly rate of \$500 appropriate.
