RULING ON ENTITLEMENT¹

On August 20, 2019, Leroy J. Stoutenburg, III filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that he sustained Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS), resulting from the adverse effects of the influenza (flu) vaccination he received on August 20, 2017. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On September 24, 2020, Respondent filed his Rule 4(c) report in which he concedes that Petitioner is entitled to compensation in this case. Respondent’s Rule 4(c) Report at 1. Specifically, it is Respondent’s position that “that [P]etitioner has satisfied

the criteria set forth in the recently revised Vaccine Injury Table (“Table”) and the Qualifications and Aids to Interpretation (“QAI”), which afford [P]etitioner a presumption of causation if the onset of GBS occurs between three and forty-two days after a seasonal flu vaccination and there is no apparent alternative cause. stated that it is his post.” *Id.* at 5 (citation omitted). Respondent further agrees that scope of damages to be awarded is limited to [P]etitioner’s GBS and its related sequelae only. *Id.*

In view of Respondent’s position and the evidence of record, I find that Petitioner is entitled to compensation.

IT IS SO ORDERED.
