DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES¹

On January 23, 2020, Debra S. DeYoung filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (SIRVA) resulting from an influenza (flu) vaccine administered to her on October 3, 2018. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On August 4, 2021, a ruling on entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation for SIRVA. On December 6, 2021, Respondent filed a proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”) indicating Petitioner should be awarded \$102,500.00. Proffer at 1. In the Proffer, Respondent represented that Petitioner agrees with the proffered

award. *Id.* at 2. Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Proffer, **I award Petitioner a lump sum payment of \$102,500.00 in the form of a check payable to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a).

The clerk of the court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

RESPONDENT’S PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION

On January 23, 2020, Debra DeYoung (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, as amended (“the Vaccine Act” or “the Act”), 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34. Petitioner alleges she suffered a “debilitating shoulder injury related to the vaccine administration with resulting chronic pain and decreased range of motion in her right shoulder and arm” as a result of a flu vaccine she received on October 3, 2018. Petition at 1.

On July 27, 2021, the Secretary of Health and Human Services (“respondent”) filed a Rule 4(c) Report indicating that this case is appropriate for compensation under the terms of the Act for a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”) Table injury, and on August 4, 2021, the Chief Special Master issued a Ruling on Entitlement finding petitioner entitled to compensation. ECF Nos. 28 and 29.

I. Items of Compensation

Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded \$102,500.00 for pain and suffering. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(4). Petitioner agrees. This amount represent all

elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a).

Petitioner agrees.

II. Form of the Award

Petitioner is a competent adult. Evidence of guardianship is not required in this case. Respondent recommends that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment as described below and requests that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following: a lump sum payment of \$102,500.00, in the form of a check payable to petitioner.¹
