### **DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES**<sup>1</sup>

On April 7, 2020, Michael Washburn filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*<sup>2</sup> (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that he suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”) as a result of a tetanus diphtheria acellular pertussis (“Tdap”) vaccine that was administered on August 28, 2017. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On February 6, 2023, a ruling on entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation for SIRVA. On May 12, 2023, Respondent filed a proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”) indicating Petitioner should be awarded \$45,675.73 (comprised of \$45,000.00 for pain and suffering and \$675.73 for past unreimbursable expenses).

Proffer at 2. In the Proffer, Respondent represented that Petitioner agrees with the proffered award. *Id.* Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Proffer, **I award Petitioner a lump sum payment of \$45,675.73 (comprised of \$45,000.00 for pain and suffering and \$675.73 for past unreimbursable expenses) in the form of a check payable to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a).

The Clerk of Court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.<sup>3</sup>

**RESPONDENT’S PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION**

On April 7, 2020, Michael Washburn (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34 (“Vaccine Act” or “Act”), alleging that he suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”) as a result of a Tdap vaccine administered on August 28, 2017. ECF No. 1 at 1. On September 16, 2021, petitioner filed a Motion for a Ruling on the Record. ECF No. 33. Respondent filed his Response to Petitioner’s Motion on October 13, 2021, recommending that entitlement to compensation be denied. ECF No. 34. On February 6, 2023, the Court issued a Ruling on Entitlement, finding that petitioner is entitled to compensation.<sup>1</sup> ECF No. 36.

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<sup>1</sup> Respondent has no objection to the amount of the proffered award of damages set forth herein. Assuming the Chief Special Master issues a damages decision in conformity with this proffer, respondent waives his right to seek review of such damages decision. However, respondent reserves his right, pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-12(e), to seek review of the Chief Special Master’s February 6, 2023, entitlement decision.

**I. Items of Compensation**

A. Pain and Suffering

Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded \$45,000.00 in pain and suffering.

*See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(4). Petitioner agrees.

B. Past Unreimbursable Expenses

Evidence supplied by petitioner documents that he incurred past unreimbursable expenses related to his vaccine-related injury. Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded past unreimbursable expenses in the amount of \$675.73. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(1)(B).

Petitioner agrees.

These amounts represent all elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a). Petitioner agrees.

**II. Form of the Award**

Petitioner is a competent adult. Evidence of guardianship is not required in this case. Respondent recommends that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment as described below and requests that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following<sup>2</sup>: a lump sum payment of \$45,675.73, in the form of a check payable to petitioner.

**III. Summary of Recommended Payments Following Judgment**

Lump sum payable to petitioner, Michael Washburn:	<b>\$45,675.73</b>
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<sup>2</sup> Should petitioner die prior to entry of judgment, the parties reserve the right to move the Court for appropriate relief. In particular, respondent would oppose any award for future lost earnings and future pain and suffering.
