DECISION ON JOINT STIPULATION¹

On July 14, 2020, petitioner filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*,² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that he suffered Transverse Myelitis (“TM”) caused-in-fact by his August 26, 2017 influenza vaccination. Petition at 1; Stipulation, filed June 17, 2022, at ¶ 4. Petitioner further alleges that he has experienced the residual effects of his condition for more than six months, that there has been no prior award or settlement of a civil action for damages as a result of his condition, and that his vaccine was administered in the United States. Petition at 20; Stipulation at ¶¶ 3-5. “Respondent denies that petitioner’s alleged TM or its residual effects were caused-in-fact or significantly aggravated by the flu vaccine; and denies that the flu vaccine caused petitioner any other injury or his current condition.” Stipulation at ¶ 6.

Nevertheless, on June 17, 2022, the parties filed the attached joint stipulation, stating that a decision should be entered awarding compensation. I find the stipulation

reasonable and adopt it as the decision of the Court in awarding damages, on the terms set forth therein.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Stipulation, **I award the following compensation:**

- A lump sum of **\$75,000.00** in the form of a check payable to petitioner; and
- A lump sum of **\$2,171.42**, representing reimbursement of a Medicaid lien for services rendered to petitioner by the State of Delaware, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner and:

Stipulation at ¶ 8. Petitioner agrees to endorse the check to Equian, LLC. *Id.* These amounts represent compensation for all items of damages that would be available under § 15(a). *Id.*

In the absence of a motion for review filed pursuant to RCFC Appendix B, the clerk of the court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

STIPULATION

The parties hereby stipulate to the following matters:

1. Clarence Deacon (“petitioner”), filed a petition for vaccine compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10 to 34 (the “Vaccine Program”). The petition seeks compensation for injuries allegedly related to petitioner’s receipt of an influenza (“flu”) vaccine, which vaccine is contained in the Vaccine Injury Table (the “Table”), 42 C.F.R. § 100.3(a)
2. Petitioner received a flu vaccine on August 26, 2017.
3. The vaccine was administered within the United States.
4. Petitioner alleges that he suffered transverse myelitis (“TM”) that was caused-in-fact by the flu vaccine. Petitioner further alleges that he suffered the residual effects of his alleged injury for more than six months.
5. Petitioner represents that there has been no prior award or settlement of a civil action for damages on his behalf as a result of his alleged injury.

6. Respondent denies that petitioner's alleged TM or its residual effects were caused-in-fact or significantly aggravated by the flu vaccine; and denies that the flu vaccine caused petitioner any other injury or his current condition.

7. Maintaining their above-stated positions, the parties nevertheless now agree that the issues between them shall be settled and that a decision should be entered awarding the compensation described in paragraph 8 of this Stipulation.

8. As soon as practicable after an entry of judgment reflecting a decision consistent with the terms of this Stipulation, and after petitioner has filed an election to receive compensation pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-21(a)(1), the Secretary of Health and Human Services will issue the following vaccine compensation payments:

- a. A lump sum of **\$75,000.00** in the form of a check payable to petitioner; and
- b. A lump sum of \$2,171.42,¹ representing reimbursement of a Medicaid lien for services rendered to petitioner by the State of Delaware, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner and:

Petitioner agrees to endorse this check to Equian, LLC. This amount represents all remaining compensation for all damages that would be available under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a).

¹ This amount represents full satisfaction of any right of subrogation, assignment, claim, lien, or cause of action the State of Delaware may have against any individual as a result of any Medicaid payments the State of Delaware has made to or on behalf of petitioner as a result of petitioner's alleged injury relating to a vaccine administered on August 26, 2017, under Title XIX of the Social Security Act, see 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(g), (h).

9. As soon as practicable after the entry of judgment on entitlement in this case, and after petitioner has filed both a proper and timely election to receive compensation pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-21(a)(1), and an application, the parties will submit to further proceedings before the special master to award reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred in proceeding upon this petition.

10. Petitioner and his attorney represent that compensation to be provided pursuant to this Stipulation is not for any items or services for which the Program is not primarily liable under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(g), to the extent that payment has been made or can reasonably be expected to be made under any State compensation programs, insurance policies, Federal or State health benefits programs (other than Title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. § 1396 et seq.)), or by entities that provide health services on a pre-paid basis.

11. Payments made pursuant to paragraph 8 and any amounts awarded pursuant to paragraph 9 of this Stipulation will be made in accordance with 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(i), subject to the availability of sufficient statutory funds.

12. The parties and their attorneys further agree and stipulate that, except for any award for attorney's fees and litigation costs, and past unreimbursed expenses, the money provided pursuant to this Stipulation will be used solely for the benefit of petitioner as contemplated by a strict construction of 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a) and (d), and subject to the conditions of 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(g) and (h).

13. In return for the payments described in paragraphs 8 and 9, petitioner, in his individual capacity, and on behalf of his heirs, executors, administrators, successors or assigns, does forever irrevocably and unconditionally release, acquit and discharge the United States and

the Secretary of Health and Human Services from any and all actions or causes of action (including agreements, judgments, claims, damages, loss of services, expenses and all demands of whatever kind or nature) that have been brought, could have been brought, or could be timely brought in the Court of Federal Claims, under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-10 et seq., on account of, or in any way growing out of, any and all known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected personal injuries to or death of petitioner resulting from, or alleged to have resulted from, the flu vaccination administered on August 26, 2017, as alleged in a petition for vaccine compensation filed on or about July 14, 2020, in the United States Court of Federal Claims as petition No. 20-858V.

14. If petitioner should die prior to entry of judgment, this agreement shall be voidable upon proper notice to the Court on behalf of either or both of the parties.

15. If the special master fails to issue a decision in complete conformity with the terms of this Stipulation or if the Court of Federal Claims fails to enter judgment in conformity with a decision that is in complete conformity with the terms of this Stipulation, then the parties' settlement and this Stipulation shall be voidable at the sole discretion of either party.

16. This Stipulation expresses a full and complete negotiated settlement of liability and damages claimed under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, as amended, except as otherwise noted in paragraph 9 above. There is absolutely no agreement on the part of the parties hereto to make any payment or to do any act or thing other than is herein expressly stated and clearly agreed to. The parties further agree and understand that the award described in this Stipulation may reflect a compromise of the parties' respective positions as to liability and/or amount of damages, and further, that a change in the nature of the injury or condition or in the

items of compensation sought, is not grounds to modify or revise this agreement.

17. This Stipulation shall not be construed as an admission by the United States or the Secretary of Health and Human Services that the flu vaccine caused petitioner's alleged injury or any other injury or his current disabilities.

18. All rights and obligations of petitioner hereunder shall apply equally to petitioner's heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and/or assigns.

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
