DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES¹

On October 13, 2020, N.L. (“Petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleged she suffered a syncopal episode as a result of a human papillomavirus (“HPV”) vaccine administered on September 14, 2018. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On April 12, 2021, a ruling on entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation. On April 19, 2022, Respondent filed a proffer on an award of compensation (“Proffer”). In the Proffer, Respondent represented that Petitioner agrees with the proffered award. Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Proffer, **I award Petitioner a lump sum payment of \$70,700.60 (representing \$70,000.00 for pain and suffering, and \$700.60 for past unreimbursed expenses) in the form of a check payable to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a).

The Clerk of Court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

RESPONDENT’S PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION

On October 13, 2020, N.L. (“petitioner”) filed a Petition for Compensation (“petition”) under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, as amended (“the Vaccine Act” or “the Act”). 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34. Petitioner alleges that she suffered “injuries, including syncope,” upon receiving a human papillomavirus (“HPV”) vaccination on September 14, 2018. *See* Petition at 1. On April 9, 2021, the Secretary of Health and Human Services (“respondent”) filed a Rule 4(c) Report concluding that petitioner suffered vasovagal syncope following HPV vaccination within the timeframe set forth in the Vaccine Injury Table. ECF No. 17. Accordingly, on April 12, 2021, the Chief Special Master issued a Ruling on Entitlement finding petitioner entitled to compensation. ECF No. 18.

I. Items of Compensation

Based upon the evidence of record, respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded a lump sum of **\$70,700.60**, for all damages, including \$70,000.00 representative of pain and suffering, and \$700.60 representative of past unreimbursable expenses related to her vaccine-

related injury. This amount represents all elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a). Petitioner agrees.

II. Form of the Award

Petitioner is a competent adult. Evidence of guardianship is not required in this case. Respondent recommends that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment as described below and requests that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following¹: a lump sum payment of \$70,760.60, representing compensation for all elements of economic and noneconomic damages, in the form of a check payable to petitioner, N.L.

III. Summary of Recommended Payments Following Judgment
