ORDER CONCLUDING PROCEEDINGS¹

On November 2, 2020, Abigail Stratton filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. § 300aa—10 through 34.² Petitioner alleged that she suffered injuries after receiving a human papillomavirus vaccination on November 6, 2017. ECF no. 1.

Because a decision had not been issued within the time specified in Vaccine Rule 10(b), a notice issued advising that “that the petitioner may withdraw the petition under section 300aa—21(b) of this title or the petitioner may choose under section 300aa—21(b) of this title to have the petition remain before the special master.” 42 U.S.C. § 300aa—12(g). On July 6, 2021, Petitioner filed a notice to withdraw her petition pursuant to 42 USC § 300aa—21(b).

In light of Petitioner’s election to withdraw the petition pursuant to 42 USC § 300aa—21(b) (promulgated as Vaccine Rule 10(d)), Petitioner’s request to withdraw her petition is **GRANTED**. Accordingly, **this Order hereby notifies the Clerk of Court that proceedings “on the merits” of this petition are now concluded, but no judgment “on the merits” should be entered by the Clerk’s Office.**
