DECISION ON ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS¹

On November 18, 2020, Christine Davidson filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the "Vaccine Act"). Petitioner alleged that she suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration ("SIRVA") caused by an influenza vaccine administered on October 19, 2019. Petition at 1, 3. On February 8, 2024, I issued a decision awarding damages to Petitioner, following briefing by the parties. ECF No. 45.

Petitioner has now filed a motion for attorney's fees and costs, requesting an award of \$26,344.36 (representing \$25,837.80 for fees and \$506.56 for costs). Petitioner's Application for Attorneys' Fees, filed May 31, 2024, ECF No. 50. In accordance with

General Order No. 9, Petitioner represents that Petitioner incurred no out-of-pocket expenses. ECF No. 50-5. Respondent did not file a response.

The rates requested for work performed through the end of 2024 are reasonable and consistent with our prior determinations, and will therefore be adopted.

I also note this case required additional briefing regarding the issue of damages. See Petitioner's Motion for a Ruling on the Record, filed Nov. 18, 2022, ECF No. 42; Petitioner's Reply to Respondent's Response to Petitioner's Brief in Support of Damages, filed Jan. 10, 2023, ECF No. 44. Petitioner's counsel expended approximately 14.9 hours drafting the damages brief and 3.8 hours drafting the reply brief, totaling 18.7 hours. ECF No. 50 at 11. I find this time to have been reasonably incurred. (And all time billed to the matter was also reasonably incurred.)

Furthermore, Petitioner has provided supporting documentation for all claimed costs, ECF No. 50-4. And Respondent offered no specific objection to the rates or amounts sought. I have reviewed the requested costs and find them to be reasonable.

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs for successful claimants. Section 15(e). **I award a total of \$26,344.36 (representing \$25,837.80 for fees and \$506.56 for costs) as a lump sum in the form of a check jointly payable to Petitioner and Petitioner's counsel, Heather Varney Menezes.** In the absence of a timely-filed motion for review (see Appendix B to the Rules of the Court), the Clerk of Court shall enter judgment in accordance with this Decision.³
