**DECISION ON ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS<sup>1</sup>**

On February 2, 2021, Paul Longo filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*<sup>2</sup> (the "Vaccine Act"). Petitioner alleged that he suffered from Guillain Barré syndrome ("GBS") caused by an influenza vaccine administered on September 12, 2019. Petition at 1. On December 20, 2023, I issued a decision awarding damages following briefing and argument by the parties. ECF No. 40.

Petitioner has now filed a motion for attorney's fees and costs, requesting an award of \$61,648.17 (representing \$60,526.60 in fees and \$1,121.57 in costs). Petitioner's Application for Attorneys' Fees and Costs, filed June 26, 2024, ECF No. 47. In accordance with General Order No. 9, Petitioner filed a signed statement indicating that he incurred no out-of-pocket expenses. *Id.* at 1.

Respondent reacted to the motion on July 1, 2024, indicating that he is satisfied that the statutory requirements for an award of attorney's fees and costs are met in this case, but deferring resolution of the amount to be awarded to my discretion. Respondent's Response to Motion at 2-3, 3 n.2, ECF No. 48. On July 2, 2024, Petitioner filed a reply, reiterating her previous request. ECF No. 49.

Having considered the motion along with the invoices and other proof filed in connection, I find a reduction in the amount of fees to be awarded appropriate, for the reason set forth below.

### ANALYSIS

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs. Section 15(e). Counsel must submit fee requests that include contemporaneous and specific billing records indicating the service performed, the number of hours expended on the service, and the name of the person performing the service. *See Savin v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 85 Fed. Cl. 313, 316-18 (2008). Counsel should not include in their fee requests hours that are "excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary." *Saxton v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 3 F.3d 1517, 1521 (Fed. Cir. 1993) (quoting *Hensley v. Eckerhart*, 461 U.S. 424, 434 (1983)). It is "well within the special master's discretion to reduce the hours to a number that, in [her] experience and judgment, [is] reasonable for the work done." *Id.* at 1522. Furthermore, the special master may reduce a fee request *sua sponte*, apart from objections raised by respondent and without providing a petitioner notice and opportunity to respond. *See Sabella v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 86 Fed. Cl. 201, 209 (2009). A special master need not engage in a line-by-line analysis of petitioner's fee application when reducing fees. *Broekelschen v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 102 Fed. Cl. 719, 729 (2011).

The petitioner "bears the burden of establishing the hours expended, the rates charged, and the expenses incurred." *Wasson v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 24 Cl. Ct. 482, 484 (1991). The Petitioner "should present adequate proof [of the attorney's fees and costs sought] at the time of the submission." *Wasson*, 24 Cl. Ct. at 484 n.1. Petitioner's counsel "should make a good faith effort to exclude from a fee request hours

that are excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary, just as a lawyer in private practice ethically is obligated to exclude such hours from his fee submission.” *Hensley*, 461 U.S. at 434.

### ATTORNEY FEES

The rates requested for work performed through the end of 2024 are reasonable and consistent with our prior determinations, and will therefore be adopted.

However, a few of the tasks performed by Ms. Durant are more properly billed using a paralegal rate.<sup>3</sup> “Tasks that can be completed by a paralegal or a legal assistant should not be billed at an attorney’s rate.” *Riggins v. Sec’y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, No. 99-382V, 2009 WL 3319818, at \*21 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. June 15, 2009). “[T]he rate at which such work is compensated turns not on who ultimately performed the task but instead turns on the nature of the task performed.” *Doe/11 v. Sec’y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, No. XX-XXXXV, 2010 WL 529425, at \*9 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. Jan. 29, 2010). **This reduces the amount of fees to be awarded by \$346.20.**<sup>4</sup>

Regarding the time billed, I note this case required additional briefing regarding entitlement and damages. See Petitioner’s Motion for Ruling on the Record (“Motion”), filed July 8, 2022, ECF No. 28; Petitioner’s Reply to Respondent’s Response to Motion, filed Oct. 24, 2022, ECF No. 36; Scheduling Order, issued Dec. 5, 2023 (regarding Damages Hearing on December 8, 2023). Petitioner’s counsel expended approximately 18.8 hours drafting the damages brief and 6.0 hours drafting the reply brief, for a combined total of 29.0 hours. ECF No. 47-1 at 11-14. I find this time to have been reasonably incurred.

I also note that Petitioner’s counsel expended substantial time (21.2 hours billed at hourly rates \$484 and \$395) analyzing the evidence and drafting the petition in this case. ECF No. 47-1 at 4-5. Given the issues presented in this GBS case, I find this time to have been reasonably incurred. (And all time billed to the matter was also reasonably incurred.)

### ATTORNEY COSTS

Petitioner requests \$1,121.57 overall costs and has provided receipts for all expenses. ECF No. 47-2. And Respondent offered no specific objection to the rates or amounts sought.

### CONCLUSION

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs for successful claimants. Section 15(e). Accordingly, I hereby GRANT Petitioner's Motion for attorney's fees and costs. I award a total of **\$61,301.97** (representing **\$60,180.40** in fees and **\$1,121.57** in costs) as a lump sum in the form of a check jointly payable to **Petitioner and Petitioner's counsel, Leah VaSahnja Durant**. In the absence of a timely-filed motion for review (see Appendix B to the Rules of the Court), the Clerk of Court shall enter judgment in accordance with this decision.<sup>5</sup>
