## **ORDER CONCLUDING PROCEEDINGS**<sup>1</sup>

On May 28, 2021, Bruce A. Ades filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*<sup>2</sup> (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that he suffered a SIRVA Table injury resulting from the adverse effects of an influenza vaccination received in his left shoulder on October 4, 2018. Petition at 1. On June 22, 2022, Petitioner filed a stipulation of dismissal.

In light of Petitioner’s “stipulation of dismissal signed by all parties who have appeared in the action” pursuant to Vaccine Rule 21(a)(1)(B), **this case is dismissed without prejudice. Accordingly, this Order hereby notifies the Clerk of Court that proceedings “on the merits” of this petition are now concluded, but no judgment “on the merits” should be entered by the Clerk’s Office.**
