**DECISION ON ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS<sup>1</sup>**

On October 8, 2021, Karyn Mason-Chavez filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*<sup>2</sup> (the "Vaccine Act"). Petitioner alleged that that she suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration resulting from a tetanus diphtheria acellular pertussis vaccine administered in her left arm on September 30, 2020. Petition, ECF No. 1. On October 18, 2023, I issued a decision awarding compensation to Petitioner based on the Respondent's proffer. ECF No. 33.

Petitioner has now filed a motion for attorney's fees and costs, requesting an award of \$31,434.26 (representing \$29,853.00 in fees plus \$1,581.26 in costs). Petitioner's Application for Fees and Costs ("Motion") filed Oct. 24, 2023, ECF No. 37. In accordance with General Order No. 9, Petitioner filed a signed statement representing that Petitioner incurred no out-of-pocket expenses. *Id.* at 34.

Respondent reacted to the motion on Nov. 14, 2023, reporting that he is satisfied that the statutory requirements for an award of attorney's fees and costs are met in this case, but deferring resolution of the amount to be awarded to my discretion. Respondent's Response to Motion at 2-3, ECF No. 38. Petitioner did not file a reply thereafter.

Having considered the motion along with the invoices and other proof filed in connection, I find reductions in the amount of fees and costs to be awarded appropriate, for the reasons set forth below.

### ANALYSIS

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs. Section 15(e). Counsel must submit fee requests that include contemporaneous and specific billing records indicating the service performed, the number of hours expended on the service, and the name of the person performing the service. *See Savin v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 85 Fed. Cl. 313, 316-18 (2008). Counsel should not include in their fee requests hours that are "excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary." *Saxton v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 3 F.3d 1517, 1521 (Fed. Cir. 1993) (quoting *Hensley v. Eckerhart*, 461 U.S. 424, 434 (1983)). It is "well within the special master's discretion to reduce the hours to a number that, in [her] experience and judgment, [is] reasonable for the work done." *Id.* at 1522. Furthermore, the special master may reduce a fee request *sua sponte*, apart from objections raised by respondent and without providing a petitioner notice and opportunity to respond. *See Sabella v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 86 Fed. Cl. 201, 209 (2009). A special master need not engage in a line-by-line analysis of petitioner's fee application when reducing fees. *Broekelschen v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 102 Fed. Cl. 719, 729 (2011).

The petitioner "bears the burden of establishing the hours expended, the rates charged, and the expenses incurred." *Wasson v. Sec'y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, 24 Cl. Ct. 482, 484 (1991). The Petitioner "should present adequate proof [of the attorney's fees and costs sought] at the time of the submission." *Wasson*, 24 Cl. Ct. at 484 n.1. Petitioner's counsel "should make a good faith effort to exclude from a fee request hours that are excessive, redundant, or otherwise unnecessary, just as a lawyer in private

practice ethically is obligated to exclude such hours from his fee submission.” *Hensley*, 461 U.S. at 434.

## ATTORNEY FEES

### A. Hourly Rates

Petitioner requests hourly rates for attorneys and paralegals performing work in this matter as follows:

The hourly rates requested for Mr. Carney and paralegals for all time billed in the 2019-23 period are reasonable and consistent with prior determinations and shall therefore be awarded herein. The 2021 and 2022 hourly rates requested for Ms. Baker, however, requires adjustment.

Categorized as a law clerk, Evan Baker was a law student who began working at the firm during the summer of 2021. ECF No. 37 at 9. She has remained at the firm, expecting to take the bar exam in July 2023, after earning her degree. *Id.* However, the hourly rate for her 2021 and 2022 work exceeds the student hourly rate paid in other cases - \$150 and \$165, for years 2021 and 2022, respectively. *E.g.*, *Wnuk v. Sec’y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, No. 21-0679V, 2023 WL 4195520, at \*2 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. May 26, 2023). Accordingly, I shall instead compensate Evan Baker’s 2021 and 2022 work at the rates of \$150 and \$165 per hour. This reduces the amount of fees to be awarded by **\$782.00**.<sup>3</sup>

Additionally, a few of the tasks performed by Mr. Carney are more properly billed using a paralegal rate.<sup>4</sup> “Tasks that can be completed by a paralegal or a legal assistant should not be billed at an attorney’s rate.” *Riggins v. Sec’y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, No. 99-382V, 2009 WL 3319818, at \*21 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. June 15, 2009). “[T]he rate at

which such work is compensated turns not on who ultimately performed the task but instead turns on the nature of the task performed.” *Doe/11 v. Sec’y of Health & Hum. Servs.*, No. XX-XXXXV, 2010 WL 529425, at \*9 (Fed. Cl. Spec. Mstr. Jan. 29, 2010). This reduces the amount of fees to be awarded by **\$284.00**.<sup>5</sup>

## **B. Billed Hours**

Regarding the number of hours billed, I find the amount to be reasonable. Thus, no further reduction in attorney’s fees is needed.

## **ATTORNEY COSTS**

Petitioner requests \$1,581.26 in overall costs. ECF No. 37 at 26. I find the majority of these costs reasonable with the exception of \$87.45 in costs incurred for “[s]canning charges for medical records, letters, intake materials, client documents for case processing.” *Id.* at 33. Such overhead expenses are inherent in operating a law firm and are thus not compensable. Accordingly, the attorney’s costs are reduced by **\$87.45**.

## **CONCLUSION**

The Vaccine Act permits an award of reasonable attorney’s fees and costs for successful claimants. Section 15(e). Accordingly, I hereby GRANT Petitioner’s Motion for attorney’s fees and costs. I award a total of **\$30,280.81 (representing \$28,787.00 in fees plus \$1,493.81 in costs) as a lump sum in the form of a check jointly payable to Petitioner and Petitioner’s counsel, David J. Carney**. In the absence of a timely-filed motion for review (see Appendix B to the Rules of the Court), the Clerk of Court shall enter judgment in accordance with this Decision.<sup>6</sup>
