DECISION AWARDING DAMAGES¹

On March 10, 2023, Josephine Corban filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered a Table injury – Guillain-Barré syndrome (“GBS”) as a result of the administration of an influenza (“flu”) vaccination on October 22, 2020. Petition at 1; Amended Petition, filed May 24, 2024, at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On January 8, 2025, a ruling on entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation for GBS. On April 8, 2025, Respondent filed a proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”) indicating Petitioner should be awarded a lump sum of \$145,087.18, for all damages, including \$145,000.00 representative of pain and suffering, and \$87.18 representative of unreimbursable out-of-pocket medical and related expenses. Proffer at 1-2. In the Proffer, Respondent represented that Petitioner agrees

with the proffered award. *Id.* Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached Proffer, **I award Petitioner a lump sum payment of \$145,087.18 (representing \$145,000.00 for pain and suffering and \$87.18 for unreimbursed expenses) to be paid through an ACH deposit to Petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a).

The Clerk of Court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

IT IS SO ORDERED.

PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION¹

I. Procedural History

On March 10, 2023, Josephine Corban (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation (“petition”) under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34, *as amended*. She alleges that, as a result of receiving the influenza vaccine on October 22, 2020, she suffered from Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS). *See* Petition. On January 6, 2025, respondent filed his Vaccine Rule 4(c) report, concluding that petitioner suffered GBS as defined by the Vaccine Injury Table, within the Table timeframe. On January 8, 2025, Chief Special Master Corcoran issued a ruling on entitlement, finding that petitioner is entitled to compensation for a GBS Table injury.

II. Items of Compensation

Based upon the evidence of record, respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded a lump sum of **\$145,087.18**, for all damages, including \$145,000.00 representative of pain and

suffering, and \$87.18 representative of unreimbursable out-of-pocket medical and related expenses. This amount represents all elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a). Petitioner agrees.

III. Form of the Award

Respondent recommends that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment, as described below, and requests that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following: A lump sum payment of **\$145,087.18** to be paid through an ACH deposit to petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to petitioner.² Petitioner agrees.
