RULING ON ENTITLEMENT¹

On August 23, 2023, Larry Cunningham filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that that he suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIVRA”) after receiving a tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis (“Tdap”) vaccination on April 27, 2022. Petition at 1. Petitioner further alleges he had no history of pain, inflammation, or dysfunction of his left shoulder, that pain offered within 48 hours of vaccination, that his pain was limited to the shoulder in which the vaccine was administered, that no other condition or abnormality has been identified to explain his left shoulder pain, and that he has suffered the residual effects of his condition for more than

six months.. See *generally* Petition. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On December 27, 2024, Respondent filed his Rule 4(c) report in which he concedes that Petitioner is entitled to compensation in this case. Respondent's Rule 4(c) Report at 1. Specifically, Respondent has indicated that based on the record as it now stands, petitioner has satisfied all legal prerequisites for compensation under the act. *Id.* at 4.

In view of Respondent's position and the evidence of record, I find that Petitioner is entitled to compensation.
