DECISION ON DAMAGES¹

On October 1, 2024, Don Andrew Hampton filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*² (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleged that he suffered a shoulder injury related to vaccine administration (“SIRVA”) as the result of an influenza (“flu”) vaccination received on February 1, 2023. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On July 17, 2025, a Ruling on Entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation for a SIRVA. On September 30, 2025, Respondent filed a Proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”). Respondent represented that Petitioner agrees with the

proffered award. *Id.* at 1 – 2. Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached proffer, **Petitioner is awarded a lump sum of \$40,534.27 (representing \$40,000.00 for pain and suffering, and \$534.27 for past unreimbursable expenses) to be paid through an ACH deposit to Petitioner’s counsel’s IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a). Proffer at 2.

The Clerk of Court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.³

PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION¹

On October 1, 2024, Don Andrew Hampton (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34 (“Vaccine Act” or “Act”), as amended, alleging that he sustained a Shoulder Injury Related to Vaccine Administration (“SIRVA”) following receipt of an influenza (“flu”) vaccination administered on February 1, 2023. Petition at 1 (ECF No. 1). On July 9, 2025, the Secretary of Health and Human Services (“respondent”) filed his Rule 4(c) Report conceding that petitioner’s claim meets the Table criteria for SIRVA. ECF No. 20. Accordingly, on July 17, 2025, the Chief Special Master issued a Ruling on Entitlement, finding that petitioner is entitled to vaccine compensation for SIRVA following the flu vaccine he received on February 1, 2023. ECF No. 21.

I. Items of Compensation

Based upon the evidence of record, respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded the following:

A. Pain and Suffering

Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded **\$40,000.00** in pain and suffering. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(4). Petitioner agrees.

B. Past Unreimbursable Expenses

Evidence supplied by petitioner documents that he incurred past unreimbursable expenses related to his vaccine-related injury. Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded **\$534.27** in past unreimbursable expenses. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(1). Petitioner agrees.

These amounts represent all elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a). Petitioner agrees.

II. Form of the Award/Recommended Payment

The parties recommend that compensation provided to petitioner should be made through one lump sum payment as described below and request that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following:²

A lump sum payment of **\$40,534.27** to be paid through an ACH deposit to petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to petitioner, Don Andrew Hampton.

Petitioner is a competent adult. Proof of guardianship is not required in this case.
