### **DECISION ON DAMAGES**<sup>1</sup>

On October 8, 2024, Cynthia Price filed a petition for compensation under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10, *et seq.*<sup>2</sup> (the “Vaccine Act”). Petitioner alleges that she suffered Guillain-Barré syndrome (“GBS”), that developed following an influenza (“flu”) vaccine administered to her on October 14, 2021. Petition at 1. The case was assigned to the Special Processing Unit of the Office of Special Masters.

On August 27, 2025, a Ruling on Entitlement was issued, finding Petitioner entitled to compensation for a Table flu/GBS injury. On October 27, 2025, Respondent filed a Proffer on award of compensation (“Proffer”). Respondent represented that Petitioner

agrees with the proffered award. *Id.* at 1-2. Based on the record as a whole, I find that Petitioner is entitled to an award as stated in the Proffer.

Pursuant to the terms stated in the attached proffer, **Petitioner is awarded a lump sum of \$217,055.00 (representing \$210,000.00 for pain and suffering, and \$7,055.00 for past unreimbursable expenses) to be paid through an ACH deposit to Petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to Petitioner.** This amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under Section 15(a). Proffer at 2.

The Clerk of Court is directed to enter judgment in accordance with this decision.<sup>3</sup>

**RESPONDENT’S PROFFER ON AWARD OF COMPENSATION**

On October 8, 2024, Cynthia Price (“petitioner”) filed a petition for compensation under the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986, 42 U.S.C. §§ 300aa-1 to -34 (“Vaccine Act” or “Act”), alleging that she suffered Guillain-Barre Syndrome (“GBS”) as defined in the Vaccine Injury Table, following administration of an influenza (“flu”) vaccine she received on October 14, 2021. Petition at 1. On August 25, 2025, the Secretary of Health and Human Services (“respondent”) filed a Rule 4(c) Report indicating that this case is appropriate for compensation under the terms of the Act for a GBS Table injury, and on August 27, 2025, the Chief Special Master issued a Ruling on Entitlement finding petitioner entitled to compensation. ECF No. 23; ECF No. 24.

**I. Items of Compensation**

A. Pain and Suffering

Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded \$210,000.00 in pain and suffering. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(4). Petitioner agrees.

B. Past Unreimbursable Expenses

Evidence supplied by petitioner documents that she incurred past unreimbursable expenses related to her vaccine-related injury. Respondent proffers that petitioner should be awarded past unreimbursable expenses in the amount of \$7,055.00. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a)(1)(B). Petitioner agrees.

These amounts represent all elements of compensation to which petitioner is entitled under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a). Petitioner agrees.

**II. Form of the Award**

Petitioner is a competent adult. Evidence of guardianship is not required in this case. Respondent recommends that the compensation provided to petitioner should be made through a lump sum payment as described below and requests that the Chief Special Master's decision and the Court's judgment award the following<sup>1</sup>: a lump sum payment of **\$217,055.00** to be paid through an ACH deposit to petitioner's counsel's IOLTA account for prompt disbursement to petitioner.
